Thirty two thousand women gathered together to talk about the issues they faced and what could be done. It was a momentous occasion remembered by those who attended as a sea of mud, rain and women. From this event came the Beijing Platform of Action, the blueprint for the issues affecting women around the world

B orn in England in 1930, I lived an untroubled innocent childhood life until one day in 1939 the sirens wailed and the  $2_{nd}$  World War broke out, though we saw very little change in our life style until the fall of France in 1941. Then, because the authority were expecting the Nazis to invade England and our town could be one of the landing

beaches, all children were to be evacuated. Our whole school was sent to Worcestershire where I stayed in several different homes until the invasion threat passed and we came back to home in 1943.

It was a spartan life then and rationing and high prices was still a way of life until I left England in 1951 as a 10 Pound Pom for Australian shores with my mother and brother in January arriving in early March in a heat wave to drive to Boulder.

onstitutional recognition is the key to reducing racism in the community and taking a positive step forward in the reconciliation process, according to 2014 Senior Australian of the Year and former Federal Minister for Aboriginal Affairs, The Honourable Fred Chaney AO.

Mr Chaney delivered the annual **Distinguished Scholars Lecture** on 'Constitutional Recognition of Indigenous Australians', hosted by The University of Notre Dame Australia Fremantle, on Wednesday 17 September 2014. Speaking to more than 280 guests, Mr Chaney said there were significant challenges and lengthy consultations ahead to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Constitution.

He said recognising Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Australian Constitution would improve the social gradient of their health as "the constant demeaning of individuals on the grounds of race is so destructive".

"We (as Australians) have established that the past is a foreign country. There is still a lot to do but we have plenty of allies," Mr Chaney said during his lecture.



"Constitutional recognition would mean that there is a slightly lower chance that we would keep our hands around the throats of Aboriginal people."

Mr Chaney also took questions from the audience on improving non-Indigenous peoples' awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, spirituality and language; how to be an effective force in reducing racism in the community; and the possibility of an Indigenous Head of State. Dr Philip Matthews, says the event's success was underpinned by the quality of Mr Chaney's lecture and the mentality of most Australians who are ready to acknowledge Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Constitution.

NCWWA vice President, Bridget Faye attended this address and gave a short report at the executive meeting.

### Homelessness

Chief Justice Wayne Martin has urged the State Government to <u>develop social welfare programs</u> to help homeless people rather than build more prisons to lock them up. Increasing funding to programs aimed at reducing homelessness and associated problems such as mental illness, substance and domestic violence is more likely to reduce crime and make the community safer than money spent on police, courts and prisons.

A recent audit of the homeless in Perth showed <u>a</u> <u>very high level of chronic disease, mental illness</u> <u>and substance abuse among those who slept</u> <u>rough.</u> Of the 168 interviewed in detail, many had been homeless for more than 6 months, a quarter were under 25. A high number of homeless adults had a history of foster care. Aboriginal people made up one third of the people interviewed.

Figures highlighted during homeless week show nearly <u>10,000 people are homeless in WA every</u> night, 25% of them are children.

Dr Andrew Davies, Director of Medical Services and Mobile GP says that WA's good economic times have increased homelessness, because many people coming to WA, in search of work, have missed out. <u>The Mobile GP service provided</u> 12,000 consultations for disadvantaged people last year. The number was rising about 3000 per year.

A Federal Government inquiry into Affordable Housing has been told that up to <u>50 cars camp in</u> <u>Kwinana car park every night during summer</u> <u>months</u>. Green's \Senator, Scott Ludlum says there are people who have fallen off the ladder in one of the least affordable housing markets in the world. He claims the problem will get worse with the recent axing of \$500 million of Federal Government programs, including the National Rental Affordability Scheme and the National Partnership agreement on Homelessness. Jonathon Shapiera, a senior public service worker, <u>lived in a vehicle when unable to fund a rental</u> <u>property.</u> He has made a submission to a Senate Inquiry into affordable housing and has included views of homeless people. He calls for a range of practical solutions including transforming former detention centres into homeless accommodation, <u>setting up shelters similar to caravan parks</u>, and turning major Centrelink offices into a one stop shop for the homeless.

Shelter WA has received a big grant to undertake policy advice, stakeholder engagement and influencing services for the WA Housing authority. They have recently made a submission to the City of Cockburn Housing affordability and Diversity Strategy. <u>They are setting up packs for</u> homeless people.

### We are very pleased to announce....

The Governor of Western Australia, Her Excellency the Hon Kerry Sanderson AO has consented to be our Patron. Kerry is the first woman appointed to the role of Governor of Western Australia.

The Australian businesswoman and former public servant said she was pleased to have been appointed, Governor of Western Australia

"I really look forward to engaging with people throughout the state," she said.

"I'm passionate about science, particularly encouraging people to study science at school and scientific research, and also jobs for our children and so I'm interested in working with business and looking at things such as international competitiveness.

"Most of all I look forward to engaging with the people and knowing what they care about and looking at ways of supporting that."

Ms Sanderson described the appointment as "humbling" and "daunting" and said she had initially been hesitant to take on the role. However, she said on reflection, she had always taken opportunities as they were offered and decided she should do the same with this role. "This is a great opportunity to engage with people, to learn more and to support the good things because Western Australia's such a great place to live," she said.

Ms Sanderson will become the state's 32nd Governor when she is officially sworn in to the three-year role on October 20.

When asked how she reflected on being the first female appointed to the role, she said she did not distinguish between men and women. "I think both do very good jobs in different ways so I would more look at it that I'm pleased to be the first woman in some ways as a role model but I think I just do the work in the same way and I've always worked with both men and women and enjoy that," she said.

Mrs Sanderson was WA's former agent general in London and was chief executive officer of the Fremantle Port Authority for 17 years.

Premier Colin Barnett has congratulated the Governor-designate, saying she will do an outstanding job.

"Kerry Sanderson is eminently suited to undertake the role and I congratulate her on her appointment," he said.

"Mrs Sanderson has had a distinguished career in the public sector and is widely respected throughout the community for her business acumen, her commitment to science and learning and her active involvement in the work of several charities.



"I am very confident that Mrs Sanderson will excel in the role and continue the excellent contribution that Malcolm McCusker made in the position."

Mrs Sanderson is currently the independent chairman of the State Emergency Management Committee and holds several non-executive director positions in the commercial sector as well as roles in the community and not-for-profit sector.

Monica Elizabeth Jolley AO was an English-born Writer who settled in Western Australia in the late 1950s.
